RESOLUTIONS. AFTER ALL, YOU HAVE A Whole year to do them.

"Consider carefully how you live—not as unwise but as wise, taking advantage of every opportunity, because the days are evil. For this reason do not be foolish, but be wise by understanding what the Lord's will is."

Renewing our minds means dwelling in the word.



In the fall of 2019, a church-wide women's Bible study was launched at Grace. We've had smaller group Bible studies before, but this is a bit different. More than we expected responded to the study (it was, after all, the first go) and we've already been prepping for the semester that begins in February.

We want women to love God, His word and His people through the study of the Word and engagement in biblical community. The churchwide Bible study offers a place to grow in all three of those aspects. We're aware that our church body is growing, and so more of these mid-sized avenues are needed for people to make personal connections inside of Grace because there are oceans of people at Sunday services. In the fall we covered Genesis 1-11 utilizing Jen Wilkin's materials, *God of Creation*. Starting in the first week of February 2020, we'll take on the rest of Genesis using the sister materials, *God of Covenant*. Join us for 10 sessions of verse-by-verse study as we dive into Genesis 12-50 by following three critical stages of understanding: comprehension, interpretation, and application.

What would make 2020 a great year? 2019 is behind us and 2020 is before us. What goals, dreams, and aspirations do you have? Let's do a thought experiment. Complete the sentence: 2020 would be a great year if...

• What are some typical ways people complete this sentence?

- What would you put in the blank? Why do we want what we want?
- If we got everything we wanted would it really make us happy?

The Blessing of Brokeness

Do you know what no one ever desires to make a year extra special? Brokenness. It never occurs to me to ask God to break me of my self-will and stubbornness. It never occurs to me to ask God to lovingly discipline me with what C.S. Lewis calls God's severe mercy. But it never occurs to me that the pathway to God's plan for my life is through the process of being broken. Most people don't believe 2020 would be a great year if God allowed them to be broken.

Last November I prayed for revival. I did not ask to be broken in the process. But that's exactly what I needed. It turns out that is a prerequisite for revival. It would seem that in order to be lifted up, we must first be brought low.

In the new year we will explore the blessing of brokenness. We will close

PRAYER IS REBELLION BY PASTOR TARRYL BOCKELMAN

If you've been following world news, you know the protestors in Hong Kong have been very persistent. After experiencing a relatively free society, they have no interest in communist doctrine limiting their human rights. Their refusal to back down from demands for a justice system that protects dissidents clearly outlines their lack of trust in Beijing's "judiciary". The people of Hong Kong refuse to settle for what they believe is an unjust system.

What do protestors in Hong Kong have to do with prayer?

In his article *Prayer*, *Rebellion Against the Status Quo*, David

Wells asserts that, as Christians, our prayer life is, in essence, a similar refusal to accept a system that is broken. Wells contends our prayer lives should be driven by "the

"Now will not God bring about justice for His elect who cry to Him day and night, and will He delay long over them? I tell you He will bring about justice for them quickly. However, when the Son of Man comes, will He find faith on the earth?" —Luke 18:7-8

absolute and undying refusal to accept as normal what is pervasively abnormal: it is the refusal of every agenda, every scheme, every interpretation that is at odds with the norm originally established by God." *In essence, it is a refusal to accept the brokenness of a fallen world, even though we are called to live in it.*

This same refusal to accept the world's injustice is seen in Jesus' teaching on prayer in Luke 18. In this passage, the widow who is denied justice refuses to back down and persists until she is granted legal protection. Wells points out the parable's illustration of the *nature* and *practice* of prayer. He adds that we must never surrender to the idea that "the power of God to change the world, to overcome

evil by good, will not be actualized."

Unfortunately, we tend to give in to the temptation to believe circumstances are unchangeable, that the seemingly immovable object or problem will never be "unstuck."

Often it's not that we don't believe God will execute justice, rather it has more to do with not being willing to accept His timeline.

We're okay with being sick or facing struggles as long as everything is better by the weekend or, at worst year's end. The application point here is clear even if it's difficult to carry out. We're called to continue to come to God with what we often think is an unsolvable problem, believe that His justice will prevail, and encourage each other to never settle for what is at odds with the revealed truth of God's character and will.



Our 2019 fiscal year finances in review

Profit & Loss

Our fiscal year runs April 1-March 31, which means we're in the home stretch of the current fiscal year.



Our Business Director, Caleb Stamp, has suggested that we zoom out and review our church finances for 2019 in January's treasure section as we enter the final quarter of our fiscal year.

Above you'll see a P&L (or profit and loss) bar graph, which shows church expenses (in blue) and the giving income (in green) and the giving trend line by month (in grey).

What we can learn from this chart is that our overall financial status is "in the black," meaning Grace is spending less than the church at-large is giving. This metric is a sign of the overall financial stewardship of church staff, and prevents things like unplanned debt. To date, the church is still debt free, and the Financial Review Committee (FRC), Staff Team, and Elder Team strive to maintain the health of our chruch through thoughtful and wise stewardship.

The specific numbers (rounded to the dollar) are on the next page in the green table. This table explains the revenue and expense of Grace finances broken down by ministry area.
